

CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

WOMINJEKA

At the KHT, we support, promote and celebrate the diversity of Aboriginal Victorian peoples and communities. Our vision is to live in a society where Aboriginal culture and history are a fundamental part of Victorian life. Our values are Respect, Honesty, Reciprocity and Curiosity.

We provide a unique environment that is rich in culture, heritage and history, and welcome and encourage all people to come together in the spirit of learning and reconciliation. I wish to especially acknowledge the support of all members of the Koorie and broader First Peoples communities in Victoria who have made an extraordinary effort to remain connected to the KHT during the aftermath of COVID-19 lockdown and social restrictions. Supporting and strengthening connections has remained crucial this year, and we have all continued to play our part.

The KHT's range of exciting online programs and events have continued to attract a wide audience, increasing access to services and removing physical travel barriers for many members of our community. Awareness of the quality and value of our services and resources has continued to grow and expand. During this financial year, we also commenced preparations for our building expansion which will see the KHT take all 3 floors of the Yarra Building at Fed Square to create a standalone and independent First Peoples arts and cultural centre; a first of its kind in an Australian Capital City. From 1,145 sq metres, the KHT will expand to 1,740 square metres. This expansion will introduce a new Wominjeka|Welcome reception foyer and desk, new temporary exhibition galleries, meeting and function spaces, an expanded retail offer, all of which will support KHT's future growth and ambitions. The KHT expansion has been made possible through the generous support of the Indigenous Land and Sea Corporation (ILSC), the Aboriginal Community Infrastructure Program (ACIP), Melbourne Arts Precinct Corporation (MAP Co), and Gandel Foundation.

Our activities in 2022-23 would not have been possible without the support of the Victorian Government in particular the Hon Steve Dimopoulos MP, Minister for Creative Industries, and The Hon Gabrielle Williams MP, Minister for Aboriginal Affairs. I also acknowledge the support of Creative Victoria and the First Peoples – State Relations Group (formerly known as Aboriginal

Victoria). In particular, I acknowledge Creative Victoria's Organisational Investment Program, which funds the KHT's exhibitions program, and the First People's - State Relations Group Community Support Fund, which funds the Koorie Family History Service, the Oral History Program, and our operational activities. Similarly, I wish to acknowledge the funding support we receive from the Australian Council for the Arts, the Indigenous Visual Arts Industry Support Program, and the City of Melbourne's Triennial Arts Grants Program as well as from the City of Melbourne's Aboriginal Melbourne team. I also acknowledge key sponsors the Ian Potter Foundation, Metro Tunnel Creative Program, Viva Energy Australia, Lendlease Australia, RMIT University, Ian Potter Foundation, Krystyna Campbell-Pretty and Family, and the Orloff Family Charitable Trust. Lastly, I acknowledge the invaluable support we receive from precinct partner Federation Square.

We continue to maintain our registration as a tax-deductible gift recipient. As a not-for-profit organisation, we rely on the wide network and generosity of our many friends and supporters to enable us to continue the important work we do to bridge the gap between Aboriginal Victoria and the wider community. Your ongoing engagement and support during the COVID-19 pandemic and its associated uncertainties has enabled us to continue our work to support, promote and celebrate the journey of our Victorian Aboriginal peoples and communities.

Finally, I wish to acknowledge and thank my fellow Board members: Dr Shannon Faulkhead, Peter Nash, Indi Clarke, Genevieve Grieves and Meena Singh. I also acknowledge and thank Tom Mosby, our CEO, Michael Kane, Business Manager (until February 2023) and Paul Inkster, Business Manager (from February 2023), as well as the KHT managers and staff for their strength of resolve to turn this year's threats into opportunities for growth. It is their commitment and dedication that is making the KHT at Federation Square such a success in these unprecedented times.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

WOMINJEKA - WELCOME

I am pleased to report on the operations of the KHT for the 2022-23 financial year.

2022-23 has been a year of incredible growth and expansion with major building renovations taking place, positioning KHT for an exciting relaunch. Once again the KHT has demonstrated its creativity and commitment to supporting our Victorian First Peoples Communities.

The KHT capacity to provide programs and services online has continued to allow for us to meet strong demand for education and professional development training opportunities for workers and students who prefer to attend workshops and training online. Our committed Cultural Experience team also continued to deliver outstanding cultural educational experiences and services to schools, corporates, the public sector, local government and not-for-profit organisations, as well as to the general public. The extraordinary growth in demand for our online cultural awareness sessions and training programs, as well as our virtual guided tours has continued into this year and underlines the value of these programs. Also, the KHT involvement in the Australian Tourism Exchange continues to draw international attention.

We remain committed to visual art exhibitions that celebrate the unique and creative talent of Victorian Aboriginal artists. The financial year started with Barring – Nganjin, Our Path • Our Journey (26 May – 28 August 2022) and went on to launch Still Sacred and Golden Dr Deanne Gilson (18 June – 18 September), A Rainbow of Tomorrows (9 October – 20 November 2022) and Layers of Blak (1 October 2022 – 19 February 2023).

In addition, we once again presented our end of year exhibition the 10th Koorie Art Show and the 5th Koorie Art Show Young Mob (3 December 2022 - 19 February 2023). We were proud to present the 'Josh Muir Digital Art Award' as part of the 10th Koorie Art Show, in memory of the late Josh Muir (Gunditjmara, Yorta Yorta, Barkindji) which was extremely successful and well attended including the virtual exhibition launch.

We are also very proud of the touring exhibition Layers of Blak, supported by Creative Victoria's 'Touring Victoria' initiative. The Layers of Blak tour will be presented from 2023 - 2025, celebrating the creative outcome of the KHT's second year of the Blak Design Program.

The Koorie Family History Service program continues to respond to an increasing, and broadening demand for its invaluable services - in particular, from members of the Stolen Generations and their descendant's seeking their family tree, family history, culture and community, all of which builds pride and creates a sense of well-being in the Koorie community. The service also offers resources to enquirers who suspect that they may have Aboriginal ancestry and are seeking a starting point.

The shopKOORIE online retail outlet has continued to be an important sales option during the year along with the pop-up shop. Sales provide a financial return to Victorian Aboriginal artists and craftspeople, and a direct benefit to their south-eastern Australian Aboriginal communities. All profits from shopKOORIE support the work of the KHT.

I wish to acknowledge the unwavering support I received from the KHT Board, the Audit & Risk Committee of the Board, and the Building Steering committee. I also commend and thank all the KHT staff, particularly the executive team: Michael Kane (Business Manager until February 2023), Paul Inkster (Business Manager from February 2023), Rob Hyatt (Cultural Experience Manager), Jenny Bates (Koorie Family History Service Manager), Gail Harradine (Curatorial Manager), and Renae Cooper (Retail and Front of House Manager). These are the teams that have kept the KHT vibrant and viable.



COLLECTIONS

The KHT continues to value and draw upon a unique and extraordinary First Peoples art collection to detail the story and history of First Peoples in South East Australia.

The collection of over 65,000 cultural belongings include clubs, tarnuks, bark canoes, weavings, jewellery, shields, paintings and digital/film.

The collection is highly significant and encompasses photographs, film/oral history, a reference library, and ranges from early historical material to key events happening in the First Peoples community today. The collection of over 65,000 cultural belongings has derived from an active collecting philosophy and linking to the diverse communities, nations and clans across Victoria. A range of items include longestablished cultural belongings and more recent cultural belongings that reflect a staunch and diverse nations and clans. Skills and knowledge are demonstratively reflected via each individual cultural belonging. From this standpoint and over 35 years the KHT has continued to care, and foster relationships with arts practitioners to further define and protect the collection in a way that provides access for the community and broader audiences the KHT engages with.

Such a philosophy has been integral to providing a powerful embedding of First Peoples art, culture, family and connection in a way that reflects the resilience and strengths of First Peoples in South Eastern Australia. The various means of collecting included, over time, purchasing at auction, donations, acquisitions from artists directly, often when it was not a focal point for collecting First Peoples art in South East Australia from other institutions.

Community members are welcome to visit the collection store and view items from their family members or to gain further insight into the collection itself. Such collecting

is through a measured response directly in line with policy and careful consideration of contributing strategically to enhancing such a valuable collection.

Koorie community members and KHT visitors are provided with a collection display on level 3 with over 20 metres of custom-built cabinetry. Such a valuable array of 2D and 3D items creates a tangible journey weaving through South East Australia, with over 200 works at any one time. This display is rotated every 3, 6, or 12 months (or as determined by conservation needs), allowing visitors to view a diverse, curated selection of KHT's collection. Cabinet drawers holding collection items are also accessible, offering visitors a chance to engage fully with highly skilled cultural belongings. In 2022-2023 collections staff continued to conduct regular changeovers on level 3.

ORAL HISTORY COLLECTION

The Oral History Collection contains over 2,000 items including audio recordings, videos, films, and transcripts. Many of these have been recorded by KHT since 1985, to capture the stories of Koorie Community members. Some items have been recorded by various organisations and donated to the KHT. Other items are copies of radio interviews, TV productions, and commercial films.

The collection has benefitted in recent times by adding increasingly to the recorded stories of Koorie Community members that is further informed by a working priority list, and in association with other projects being undertaken by KHT. Staff are constantly striving to form meaningful relationships with writers, film-makers and Community members to provide written and audiovisual recorded material to complement exhibitions and events that have taken place at KHT this year. In early 2023, Wirrim Media, in conjunction with the KHT Oral History program, completed filming at Lake Tyers with an early cut now provided to the KHT. Short essays and interviews continue to be an important way of telling the stories of Community.

KHT acknowledges the generous support of the Oral History program by Viva Energy Australia and First Peoples - State Relations, which ensures that KHT continues to preserve the voices and oral histories of Victorian Aboriginal Elders for future generations. KHT also acknowledges the Elders who generously agreed to have their voices and stories recorded.

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ORAL HISTORY ACCESS

Access to the Oral History collections is via a number of online platforms and direct reproduction requests where third parties can request a copyright licence to use material where appropriate.

We have shown 11 Oral Histories on the Digital Facade at Fed Square.

Oral Histories can be downloaded for viewing using Vimeo via our website - there are currently 86 videos available to view. We have had a number of requests to link these oral histories to other sites, providing further access. Several organisations successfully applied for a non-exclusive copyright licence to use KHT oral history material, including Elizabeth Morgan House and City of Melbourne.

Oral History material from the KHT collection is successfully viewed regularly on the Victorian Collections website which has been recently updated. Exposure to collection images does result in a number of inquiries for loans as to cultural belongings in the collection, primarily for external exhibitions. A selection of oral histories are also available for viewing at KHT in the public areas including within exhibition spaces and on level three where we currently have captioned videos playing on a screen which relate to exhibitions on display in the building.

ORAL HISTORY DIGITISATION AND DATA ENTRY

KHT collections staff have proceeded with the digitisation of existing oral history material based on the formats most susceptible to obsolescence. Currently 407 audiocassette tapes and 49 DAT recordings are in the process of being digitised. This stage of the project will see the completion of digitisation of all the audio cassette and DAT material in the KHT Oral History collection.

268 recently digitised VHS tapes have been backed up onto KHT's server and cloud storage. Staff continue to store digitised and born-digital files using best practice filing systems to store master and edited versions of digitised files on the KHT server. Oral histories are registered as collection items on Mimsy XG (KHT Collections Management Software). Contents of Groups and Collections Digital Archive share points are backed up onto external hard drive and cloud storage. Several oral history items have been digitised for use in exhibitions and at the request of Community members.

REFERENCE LIBRARY

The KHT reference library holds around 4,000 items, relating to the history and culture of the Aboriginal people of South Eastern Australia. The collection includes publications by the KHT, historic books, contemporary published works, unpublished documents, theses and serials.

The reference library is primarily held by the KHT for our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community members and researchers, to assist with research requests relating to local history and culture. Due to limited staff resources, the reference library is accessible by appointment only. Several researchers and students accessed the library to support their studies and writing. We continue to support Elders in accessing library material relating to cultural heritage. The library is a valuable resource for researching exhibitions and drawing upon any additional documentation as required.

In 2022-2023 five publications were added to the reference library and registered in Mimsy XG as well as several exhibition catalogues from KHT exhibitions. The reference library is catalogued on KHT's collection management database and currently there are also 425 records extracted as a sample and loaded to Victorian Collections and accessible online.


COLLECTIONS CARE AND CONSERVATION

KHT staff continue to maintain effective conservation practices, with preventive conservation being the most practical means of promoting the long-term preservation of the cultural belongings in KHT's collection.

A number of projects in the lead-up to the KHT redevelopment have been instigated, that support the practice of collection care, integrated pest management, monitoring of environmental control of collections and exhibition spaces.

Staff are currently working towards completion of updates in policy and procedures for the KHT Collection Policy. A Facilities Report was undertaken to evaluate factors that will support KHT's ability to borrow collection items from other institutions.





EXHIBITIONS

During 2022-2023, the KHT's Curatorial, Collections and Public Programs team has continued to progress ideas and research into proactive and highly creative exhibitions and public programs.

At the same time, the development of exhibition ideas that strengthen access to the KHT's unique collection of cultural belongings and artworks, inspires and promotes pride in identity. The engagement of artists and Elders in creating an intersection of knowledge embedded in deep listening, closely aligns with a broad range of cultural protocols, and First Peoples arts and design protocols. In 2022-2023 opportunities for exhibition touring have been embraced, extending the geographical and community reach of KHT's programming from Metropolitan Melbourne to regional Victoria and interstate.

Drawing upon elements of respectful engagement and creating culturally safe spaces for families, communities, from our young to our Elders to engage and feel part of every part of the journey.

KHT staff work closely with overseas visitors who visit our exhibition spaces to encourage understanding of current perspectives and facilitate learning. New ways of considering heritage and breaking that down into what defines art and propels conceptual ideas into practice, has encouraged ways of presenting themes visually within the gallery space.

Over the year the KHT exhibited the work of over 218 First Peoples artists and 366 artworks, across 6 exhibitions. The KHT also produced 5 exhibition catalogues and commissioned 31 catalogue texts during this time.

During 2022-2023, the KHT developed and continued to work with a range of exhibition partners such as Melbourne Fringe, Open House Melbourne, Women's Art Register, Connecting Home Inc., Link-Up Victoria, VACCA and funding bodies including Creative Victoria, City of Melbourne, the Federal Indigenous Visual Arts Industry Support Program, the Australia Council for the Arts and ANZ.

During 2022-23, the following major exhibitions were presented in the KHT's galleries:

SECOND SKIN — ESSENCE OF COUNTRY 4 MARCH — 9 JULY 2023

Second Skin – Essence of Country brought together artworks and cultural belongings from the KHT's Collection, to celebrate the ongoing history and skillful use of animal pelts by Victorian First Peoples. The exhibition featured a range of possum skin cloaks, kangaroo skins, headdresses, bags, shields, jewellery and more, expressing the resilience of Victorian First Peoples, Country and culture. The exhibition resonated with the deep cultural significance of these items and the connections they enable – connections to each other, culture and Country.

10TH KOORIE ART SHOW 3 DECEMBER 2022 — 19 FEBRUARY 2023

The Koorie Art Show is an annual exhibition showcasing the diverse talent of Victoria's First Peoples Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists in one inclusive space.

The Koorie Art Show is an open-entry, non-acquisitive award exhibition, presenting the works of Koorie and Victorian based Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists (new and emerging, mid-career and senior) aged 17 years and above. All submitted entries are included in the exhibition and are eligible for one of several cash awards.

In 2022, KHT were proud to present the 'Josh Muir Digital Art Award' as part of the 10th Koorie Art Show, in memory of the late Josh Muir (Gunditjmara, Yorta Yorta, Barkindji). Josh was a passionate supporter and friend of the KHT having exhibited at the KHT in group shows, held his first solo exhibition with us in 2018, and was an entrant in the Koorie Art Show from the very 1st Koorie Art Show in 2013 and subsequent years until 2018. Josh was also the recipient of the 'Creative Victoria Award for Excellence in Any Media' for his entry in the 2nd Koorie Art Show in 2014, and the 'Lendlease Reconciliation Award' in the 6th Koorie Art Show in 2018.

To celebrate the tenth year of the Koorie Art Show the exhibition was accompanied by a special edition digital catalogue, which included written reflections from ten artists who have previously entered the Koorie Art Show, as well as essays from past and present staff on the importance of this annual exhibition.

A RAINBOW OF TOMORROWS 9 OCTOBER — 20 NOVEMBER 2022

A Rainbow of Tomorrows was guest-curated by Stone Motherless Cold in partnership with Melbourne Fringe Festival and City of Melbourne.

A Blak futurism queer art exhibition, A Rainbow of Tomorrows was a multidisciplinary exhibition of the works of queer First Peoples artists along with multiple activating public program events throughout the duration of the exhibition. Public programs included: opening and closing night events with drag and cabaret performance; The Hazy Lounge featuring spoken word and musical performances; a life-drawing session; and a panel discussion exploring Blak queer futurist perspectives. A sum of its parts, A Rainbow of Tomorrows invited an array of queer, creative mob to carve out a space for respite from the heteropatriachal settler-colony, and explore our individual and collective visions of utopia in this place.

In Layers of Blak, each designer presented a collection of jewellery reflecting their personal stories, layered with meaning – of healing, resilience, collaboration and empowerment.

In its third year, the KHT's *Blak Design* program is about supporting, promoting and celebrating First Peoples cultural innovation within the Victorian design sector while providing a platform for nurturing sustainable, First Peoples design practices.

The 2022 Blak Design program involved a four-week intensive jewellery making course, created and delivered by established contemporary jewellers Blanche Tilden and Laura Deakin, with technical assistance from Lindy McSwan. This exhibition was accompanied by a comprehensive digital catalogue including artist stories and 'in conversation' with the 11 artists, 2 mentors and studio technician.

BARRING — NGANJIN: OUR PATH • OUR JOURNEY 26 MAY — 25 SEPTEMBER 2022

Presented in partnership with Link-Up Victoria and with curatorial assistance from Aunty Bev Murray (Link-Up Victoria), Barring – Nganjin meaning 'Our Path Our Journey' was an exhibition of artworks by Stolen Generations Survivors, with artists telling their stories of grief, loss and resilience – but also demonstrating hope, resilience and triumph. Each survivor's story is their own act of truth telling. It is both a creative response and an act of healing that reflects historical trauma but also resilience.

The exhibition brought together over 45 artworks that include paintings, weaving, prints, mixed media amongst others from the Link-Up Victoria, Connecting Home and KHT's Collections.

BLAK DESIGN PROGRAM

The Blak Design Program supports our First Peoples Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists, craftspeople and designers living in Victoria, by implementing a targeted professional development and mentoring program.

Developed in partnership with the National Gallery of Victoria and RMIT University, and generously supported by the Ian Potter Foundation, and Fed Square as precinct partner, the Program aims to foster First Peoples cultural innovation within the Victorian design sector, underpinned by the International Council of Design's document titled: International Indigenous Design Charter. Protocols for Sharing Indigenous Knowledge in professional design practice.

On an annual basis, for a period of four years, the Program focuses on a design discipline, and provides mentoring in design, production, and small business skills to nurture long-term sustainable design practices.

In the third year of the Program commencing in January 2023, the spotlight centred on ceramic design. Participants in the third year Program are: Annie Brigdale (Yorta Yorta), Suzanne Connelly-Klidomitis (Wiradjuri), Nicholas Currie (Yugambeh, Kuku Yalanji), Trina Dalton-Oogjes (Wadawurrung, Gunditjmara), Eleanor Franks (Gubbi Gubbi), Mick Harding (Taungurung), Darcy McConnell (Dja Dja Wurrung, Yorta Yorta), Sean Miller (Gamilaroi), Corina Muir (Yorta Yorta, Boonwurrung).



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CULTURAL EXPERIENCES



During the 22/23 financial year, the Education Unit had a name change to Cultural Experiences to greater reflect the work of the unit and the experiences of our participants across workshops and tours.

BUILDING ABORIGINAL CULTURAL COMPETENCY

During the 22/23 financial year, the Education Unit had a name change to Cultural Experiences to greater reflect the work of the unit and the experiences of our participants across workshops and tours.

The Cultural Experiences team delivered its greatest number of Aboriginal Cultural Competency workshops in a financial year and as in previous years, to a wide range of sectors and participants. These included:

88 workshops to 1,483 participants

165 workshops to 3,051 participants

101 workshops to 2,065 participants

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS 64 workshops to 1,198 participants

35 workshops to 635 participants

SMALL GROUP AND INDIVIDUAL 11 workshops to 186 participants

In total, the team delivered 464 workshops to eclipse the previous financial year by 88 to a total number of 8,618 participants.

During the current financial year, the team had an increase of face-to-face workshops, returning back to our more traditional workshops with 158 delivered at the KHT and 96 delivered at client locations. They also delivered 210 online workshops which continues to support our reach and accessibility to deliver to a wider range of clients in locations beyond Melbourne including regional Victoria and also clients with a national footprint with staff attending from interstate.

The team maintained the delivery of a range of workshop offerings including our Building Aboriginal Cultural Competency, Cultural Safety in the Workplace and a hybrid of competency and safety which we typically delivered to State Government Departments.

In regards to State Government, the team renewed contracts to continue their work to deliver workshops for DFFH, Health, DJPR (now DJSIR) and DET. They also delivered workshops to DEECA, DJCS and DTP. Through their continued work over a number of years, feedback and word of mouth, the KHT has established itself as a preferred provider of cultural workshops for State Government.

As in previous years, the team has maintained a number of regular clients such as Victorian Legal Aid, Swinburne University, Women's Hospital, Royal Australian College of General Practitioners, NAB, Brotherhood of St. Laurence, Richmond Football Club and a number of Local Governments across the State. They have also created new relationships and partnerships throughout 2022/2023 to provide regular workshops that will continue into the next financial year including the CPA, Centre for Multicultural Youth, Southern Program Alliance, Southern Rail Loop Authority, Wesfarmers, Federation University and the North Melbourne Football Club.

Throughout the year the team had many more returning clients beyond the aforementioned but also established relationships with new clients, notably the NBL, Nike, Drake International and Activision.

During the reporting period, the team increased the number of cultural facilitators . New team members include Tania Rossi, Terri Schleibs and Bronwyn David. Currently, this is the largest the team has ever been to ensure they continue to maintain the high number of workshops and with the feedback they have received in regards to the new facilitators, they continue to maintain a high standard of delivery.

TOURS

The cultural experiences tours during 22/23 had a substantial increase as the KHT finally returned to full tour operations post-covid.

Throughout the reporting period, the team delivered a total of 658 tours (13,351 participants) booked for both schools and group tours, approximately three times up from the 223 tours in the previous year. These were conducted across a number of sectors, with the education sector continuing to be a greatest single source of group bookings:

Corporate – 127 tours to 2,509 participants

Government – 75 tours to 1,439 participants

Non-profit – 60 tours to 1,093 participants

Educational Institutions – 231 tours to 5,505 participants

Tourism – 123 tours to 1,941 participants

Other – 42 tours to 864 participants

During the year, the team increased the Public Tours from 3 to 5 days a week, running Monday to Friday from 1.00pm to 2.00pm. Across the

period of 2022/2023, over 1,822 visitors booked onto the Public Tours and expect to have that number increase in the future.



TOURISM EXPERIENCE

The KHT is now listed at 67 on the best visitor experiences to have in Melbourne on Trip Advisor and has also been given a Travellers Choice Award for 2023 on their website.

Visit Victoria and Tourism Australia continue to provide support to the KHT's tourism experience. Visit Victoria subsidised the team's attendance at the Australian Tourism Exchange (ATE2023) where they promoted the KHT. This has resulted in new partnerships and tourism marketing opportunities. For example, the KHT is now listed as a tourism experience on Pelago, a tourism platform owned by Singapore Airlines. The teams has also incrased bookings through the Rezdy platform and private bookings through the tourism sector as a result of attendance at ATE2023.

Supporting this further is the KHT's continued Discover Aboriginal Experience (DAE) membership, now in its fourth year, with Tourism Australia. Through membership as a Tourism Australia Signature Experience, the KHT is promoted both Nationally and Internationally through Tourism Australia's marketing networks.

Kieran Stewart continued in his full-time role of Tours Coordinator while in February we added Lucas Hyatt in the role of Visitor Experience Officer 4 days a week, 10.00am to 4.00pm and this will increase to full time at the start of the new financial year. Both Kieran and Lucas conduct tours and we also have 4 casual Cultural Tour Guides.

To support Kieran in his role, Visit Victoria provided training opportunities including a Marketing Excellence Program and an International Marketing Program which were also attended by Jacob Hyatt to support our tourism knowledge.



KOORIE FAMILY HISTORY SERVICE

The Koorie Family History Service (KFHS) provides a highly confidential, client-based, genealogical research and referral service for Survivors of the Stolen Generations and their families, and the Victorian Koorie Community.

We acknowledge that the personal information clients entrust us with, may be sensitive and the KFHS team maintain the strictest level of confidentiality, in accordance with Australian Privacy Laws.

CLIENT REQUESTS

In 2022-2023, the KFHS received 385 new requests for family trees and family history information, which is a significant 18.8% increase from the 324 requests received during the previous financial year. The KFHS had an increased average of 32 new requests per month between July 2022 and June 2023, compared with an average of 27 new requests per month for the previous financial year. The KFHS Staff have continued to be inundated with phone enquiries, and have also received an increase in the amount of email enquiries.

At the end of the 2022-2023 financial year, the KFHS was actively researching 711 client requests, and had completed and closed a further 393 requests, which is a significant 73.9% increase in the completion rate from the previous financial year. A further 626 requests were pending, either due to application forms and/or ID not being returned, or waiting for additional information to determine if they are eligible to become a KFHS client, or waiting for a search pack to be sent if they do not meet the KFHS criteria.

Of the 711 requests being actively researched, 184 were from clients who identify as Stolen Generations Survivors and their descendants, (two of whom are in custody) and 527 were General requests. Of these General requests, 214 consisted of Koorie Community members requesting copies of their family tree (24 of whom are in custody), and 313 were Family History enquiries, who are searching for possible Aboriginal heritage.

WORKSHOPS AND EVENTS

After delivering a larger than normal volume of online workshops during 2020 and 2021, the KFHS wound back workshop delivery in 2022 to focus on completing family trees, sending search packs and following up on outstanding enquiries.

The KFHS Unit has resumed providing virtual family history workshops in 2023 via Zoom, upon request, but are limiting the number held per year moving forward. The KFHS Unit provided Family History Workshops, via Zoom, for Djirra's Koori Women's Place on 1st March 2023, and for the Boondawarn Wilam Healing Service on 15th June 2023.

The KFHS team attended the National Sorry Day event at the Wunggurrwil Dhurrung Centre in Werribee on 26th May 2023, and the Victorian Aboriginal Remembrance Service at the Shrine on 31st May 2023.

ShopKOORIE stocks products that are designed and/or crafted by our Victorian first Peoples. Our diverse collection showcases the unique cultural heritage and artistic traditions of Victorian First Peoples.

ShopKOORIE is passionate about showcasing the work of artists from Victoria and providing them with opportunities to sell their products.

Buying from us, you know that you are purchasing an authentic South- Eastern Australian First Peoples designed or crafted product. ShopKoorie also makes a significant contribution to improving outcomes for our communities by developing and improving the knowledge, understanding, appreciation and practice of First Peoples arts and design.

As we undergo renovations and prepare to expand into a larger retail space, we are actively seeking new artists and designers to partner with. ShopKoorie will continue to strengthen its connection to all of our key holders, particularly Victorian First People communities and be the go-to place for authentic, high quality and memorable experiences. Shopkoorie continues to foster strong partnerships and collaborations with Victorian First Peoples designers, artists and craftspeople.

While noting that some portion of last financial year's revenue was COVID affected, there has been a 96.1% increase from last financial year's revenue. The Pandemic, which disrupted our operations, also created opportunities for ShopKoorie and improvements to ongoing digital an on-line shopping platform. We are optimistic that emerging opportunities will see positive results into the future.

Shopkoorie employs majority First Peoples employees in both casual, part-time and full-time roles.

VENUE HIRE



As a bold and adventurous 21st century organisation, we offer an inclusive and welcoming place for all, a place for everyone, a unique space in which Koorie and non-Koorie people can experience, learn, connect and reconnect with the living Aboriginal culture, heritage and histories of Victoria in a safe environment. We are a knowledge bank and vital community resource, a virtual as much as a physical place for sharing, learning, collaborating and creating.

Our Venue Spaces are situated in the bustling centre of Melbourne's CBD, an important gathering place for the Kulin Nation people. With breathtaking views of both the Birrarung and Federation Square, our venue spaces boast the largest collection of Koorie art and artefacts in Australia. We take pride in promoting and celebrating the continuing cultures and Songlines of the First Peoples of South – Eastern Australia.

Demand for our venue hire spaces has grown strongly with a total of 176 room bookings. We expect that with the addition of two new rooms after the KHT's expansion program, our venue hire bookings will increase. Again, noting that last financial year was COVID affected, this financial year's revenue has seen a 140.5% increase from the pre-ceding year.

PUBLIC PROGRAMS



At the KHT our publice programs are designed to connect people with Koorie culture in authentic ways that value First Peoples voices. Our audiences range from community, children, First Peoples artists, tourists and the general public. Our offerings include artist talks, panel discussions, children's workshops, creative workshops for adults, celebrations of significant dates, involvement with other local festivals and professional development for First Peoples arts practitioners.

Our public programs connect to our exhibitions and collection to allow people direct access to stories, understanding and history.

Across over 40 events we engaged with over 2,000 people in person.

Our major events for the year included 'Blak Design Matters - First Peoples Design Forum', 'Koorie Krismas 2022' and our award winning collaboration with Deadly Fringe in presenting the exhibition 'A Rainbow of Tomorrows' with a suite of public programs produced awnd designed with Stone Motherless Cold.

Blak Design Matters - First Peoples Design
Forum was a day-long forum bringing together
First Peoples to discuss issues around art, craft,
design and creative practice. Conversation
panels, coffee, food, entertainment, karaoke,
stalls, networking and opportunities to connect.
Presented by the KHT in partnership with Creative
Victoria, and as part of YIRRAMBOI Festival
2023, the Forum extended our work in the design
space seen in our 2018 exhibition Blak Design
Matters and subsequent Blak Design Program.
We collaborated with Fed Square, KIN Fashion,
Solid Lines and Baluk Arts as Forum partners and
content creators.



OFFICE OF THE CEO

The office of the CEO has a small team that provides services to the KHT's program areas as well as to the Board and Committee of the Board. These services include Finance, Governance, Human Resources, Operational Management, Marketing, Information Technology and Reporting.

As a service department of the KHT, we have been able to instigate a number of significant improvements during the year.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The KHT commenced an Information
Technology transformation project in the 202223 financial year. The project's main objectives
include increasing data security protocols
and redundancy, upgrading office internet
access and speeds, increasing storage and
data back-up facilities and replacing aged
infrastructure such as the existing IT server.


To date, the KHT has accomplished all of the main objectives of the project and, in doing so, has placed the KHT in a position whereby it is 'future-proof' to allow for any significant changes in the KHT's use of software programs and applications, back-up and storage allowances or significant changes in its current operating environment.

DATABASE MANAGEMENT

Building on from the work achieved in the previous year, the KHT continues to expand its use of the current Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system. Work has commenced on bespoke modules within the CRM that better enable the KHT to manage its customer base for Walking Tours and Workshop and prepare for the expansion of services following the renovation project's completion in late 2023.

Additionally, work has been finalised on the creation of a single database of contacts, visitors, partners, donors and key contacts across all of the KHT's services and interactions. This work will now enable the KHT to tailor communications and information to our contact list specific to the needs and interest of individual contacts or groups.

ACCOUNTING SYSTEM

In the latter part of the 2022-23 period, the team commenced preparing for a change in the accounting platform the KHT has used for a number of years.

This new platform will enable greater and more immediate financial reporting, it will provide employees with an online profile that allows them to manage leave requests and timesheets, thus removing the need for paper-based processes and greatly improves the integration between the current CRM and the accounting system in the creation and distribution of invoicing and related documentation. The cross over for this project is due in early 2023-24.

HUMAN RESOURCES

The KHT has completed a full audit of all employee contracts and, where relevant, casual award rates and agreements. This audit was conducted to ensure that the KHT is compliant and that all staff have in place correct and up to date documentation in place. The audit has shown that the KHT remains compliant in all relevant areas.

The KHT launched its first Employee Assistance Program (EAP) in 2022-23. The EAP is designed to provide a range of confidential counselling and information services to all staff to assist them with work related and/or personal challenges that they may face from time to time. The program also provides services that are specific to and tailored for First Peoples

MARKETING

The KHT was presented with a challenge late in the 2022-23 year in readying its communications strategy for the commencement of the renovation works in July 2023. The KHT needed to build a step-by-step communications program that informed customers, partners, visitors and the broader community of the various stages of the renovation project, these being, the start of the works, the establishment of the pop-up shopKOORIE site external to the Yarra Building, the partial closure of the KHT at the Yarra Building through to the full closure of the Yarra Building through to the full re-opening of the KHT at the completion of the works.

This program included direct communications to partners, donors and customers, website messaging, external signage, Fed Square communications and social media content. The program will continue into 2023-24 and has been successful in its co-ordination and objectives to date.

The Office of the CEO continues to provide the services needed to allow the KHT to continue and to improve on its daily operations.






